26	standing committee and as such empowered Naabik'iyati' Committee to assist and	
27	coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating to proposed

12	The Navajo Nation hereby approves the Navajo Nation's legislative priorities relating to the
13	State of Arizona for 2020 as determined by the 24th Navajo Nation Council and authorizes
14	the Navajo Nation President, the Navajo Nation Speaker, and their designees, and the
15	Naabik'íyáti' Committee, to advocate the position of the Navajo Nation with the State of
16	Arizona, State of Arizona Legislature, Arizona State Agencies, and the State of Arizona
17	Governor's Office for the preservation of funding and policies in the Navajo Nation's
18	priority areas.
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
