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Navajo Nation Council Fall Session to Bring Awareness to Boarding School Survivors, Indigenous Women, and Domestic Violence

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. — The 24th Navajo Nation Council announces themes for the 2021 Fall Session from Oct. 18 to 22, 2021, at the Navajo Nation Council Chambers in Window Rock, Ariz.

The week raises awareness of domestic violence, bullying, and breast cancer prevention while honoring boarding school survivors and all missing and murdered Diné relatives.

"Our people continue to journey through many challenges and traumas, but it is the teachings of our elders that guide us forward with Hozhó," said Council Delegate Herman Daniels Jr. (Ts'ah Bii' Kin, Navajo Mountain, Shonto, Oljato). "As naat'áaniis from our communities, K'é is the catalyst in bringing people together. We have to move forward and begin to heal as a people."

Several legislations go before the Naabik'íyáti' Committee next week before full consideration by the Council at the fall session.

"Every quarter the Navajo Nation Council convenes in the people's house to discuss and plan for the future of our great nation," said Speaker Seth Damon (Bááháálí, Chichiltah, Manuelito, Tsé Łichíí, Rock Springs, Tsayatoh) "We invite everyone to wear the colors of each day to bring awareness to the issues impacting families around Diné Bikéyah. October brings us a new year so let us work together to address the critical needs of the Navajo people."

Among the bills listed on the proposed agenda for the Naabik'íyáti' Committee is to approve \$68 million in Síhasin Funds for the Department of Water Resources to complete twelve water connection projects in Eastern Agency.

Legislation No. 0206-21 provides \$1.8 million from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) in emergency funding for 110 Navajo Nation Chapters to assist with monsoon flood relief and winter preparations.

The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) is requesting \$27,991,281 million in Síhasin Funds for the completion of 2,794 utility projects.

Legislation No. 0201-21 approves the transfer of the Navajo Transit System from the Division of General Services to the Navajo Division of Transportation.

The legislative process requires a majority of approval to be considered for the proposed agenda at the fall session.
