Purpose of this Legislation:

to approve \$267,184 out of the UUFB to go to the Division of Natural Resources - Resources Enforcement Department to then disburse to the nonprofit organization Animal Rez-Q, Inc. to carry out its "Navajo Nation Spay, Neuter, Vaccination Blitz 2022" in cooperation with partners including the Navajo Nation's Animal Control Program.

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §102(A). As such, the Council may approve supplemental appropriations whenever additional sources of revenues above current revenue projections are anticipated and such revenues exceed the required reserve amount. 12 N.N.C. §820(L).
- B. The Navajo Nation Council may approve emergency legislation to address, among other urgent matters, an emergency problem that presents a direct threat to the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(16).
- C. This Act is offered as an emergency measure because of the estimated 3,000 serious injuries from dog bites and attacks that occur on the Navajo Nation each year, and the deaths of Navajo

citizens by vicious dog attacks over the past several years, most recently in May of 2021. This Act is meant to prevent further attacks, with resulting severe injuries and potential deaths, by significantly reducing the thousands of unwanted stray dogs running at large across the Navajo Nation. These feral dogs, recently estimated to be as high as 250,000 animals, not only present the risk of attacks on persons and livestock, but they pose an ever-present danger to motorists and a serious health hazard to Navajo communities by spreading rabies, intestinal parasites, and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and other illnesses through the ticks they carry. - D. All people on the Navajo Nation are entitled to government services that protect the public's health, safety, and welfare, and the lack of such services is a direct threat to the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation.
- E. The restrictions on supplemental appropriations, including all monies from the Navajo Nation's Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance, include:
 - 1. Payment of recurring government operating expenses shall be from recurring revenues, and payment of nonrecurring expenses shall be from nonrecurring revenues such as UUFB funds. 12 N.N.C. §820(E), §820(F).
 - 2. Specifically, the UUFB shall not be used for recurring government expenditures or operations. 12 N.N.C. §820(J), §820(L).
 - 3. Nonrecurring revenues such as UUFB funds may be used only after the Controller determines whether or not such revenues are subsidizing an imbalance between the Navajo Nation's recurring revenues and expenditures, and government expenditures shall only be authorized if a long-term (3-year to 5-year year) forecast shows that the operating deficit will not continue; otherwise, nonrecurring revenues will be added to the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance. 12 N.N.C. §820(F).
 - 4. The above provisions in Title 12 may be amended or waived by a two-thirds vote of the full Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. §820(F), 12 N.N.C. §880.
 - 5. In compliance with 12 N.N.C. §820(F) all UUFB funding requests must be reviewed by the Controller. Such review is also required because the Controller determines which revenues and expenses are recurring and which are non-recurring. 12 N.N.C. §820(L).
 - 6. In compliance with 12 N.N.C. §820(M) all UUFB funding requests must be submitted to

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SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

A. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic of the past two years, the Navajo Nation's efforts at enforcing its animal control laws, as well as spaying and neutering the stray dog population on the Navajo Nation, have been severely hampered. This has resulted in an unprecedented number of dogs running at large in all communities across the Navajo Nation.

the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for a budget impact analysis.

7. Supplemental funding such as UUFB appropriations shall lapse at the end of the current

fiscal year unless the Navajo Nation Council decides otherwise. 12 N.N.C. §820(N).

- B. In April 2021, Navajo Nation Animal Control Program reported to the Associated Press that 10 11 the reservation dog population is up to approximately 250,000 dogs.
 - C. The Navajo Nation's Animal Control Program reported in June of 2021 that over 3,000 individuals are treated each year at hospitals and clinics for animal attacks and bites, and the majority of these victims are children and the elderly. **EXHIBIT A**.
 - D. According to the Navajo Times (May 18, 2021 issue), the teenage girl mauled to death by a vicious dog in Fort Defiance was the fifth person killed by dogs on the Navajo Nation since 2010. The victims include a 56-year-old man near Gallup, New Mexico in 2010, an 8-yearold boy in Pine Hill, New Mexico in 2012, a 3-year-old boy in Seba Dalkai, Arizona in 2016, and a Kayenta woman in the Fall of 2020.
 - E. The most recent comprehensive study regarding this serious problem was addressed in a White Paper Analysis issued in January of 2017 by the Navajo Nation Animal Control Program. In this paper, the Program stated: "[o]ver the last five years there has been increase in the severity of dog bite cases. The Animal Control Officers agree that the dogs are becoming more vicious and aggressive." **EXHIBIT B**. This White Paper was attached as an Exhibit to Resolution No. CJY-64-18, adopted in the Summer of 2018, that amended Title 3 and Title 13 of the Navajo Nation Code to address the roaming dog problem on the Navajo Nation.
 - F. Animal Rez-Q, Inc. ("ARQ") is a private nonprofit 26 U.S.C. §501(c)(3) entity that was incorporated under Navajo Nation law in 2014. ARQ provides affordable animal wellness services to tribal nations. See www.animalrezq.org. ARQ's Founder and President is Glenda

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- G. ARQ is requesting \$267,184 in UUFB funds to conduct a widescale spaying, neutering, and vaccination project across the Navajo Nation from April 1, 2022 to September 30, 2022. ARQ plans to work with the Navajo Nation Animal Control Program and Altered Tails Barnhart Clinic in Phoenix, Arizona, in carrying out this expansive project. Altered Tails is the largest nonprofit spay and neuter organization in Arizona. See www.alteredtails.org.
- H. ARQ's project, titled: "Navajo Nation Spay, Neuter, Vaccination Blitz 2022" will greatly mitigate the problem of the current overpopulation of some 250,000 stray and feral animals on the Navajo Nation. ARQ explains the need for this project, its request for funds, and the logistics of its plan to provide free spaying, neutering, and vaccinations of some 4000 animals for Navajo Nation residents. **EXHIBIT D**.
- I. ARQ has prepared a detailed timeline and budget for its proposed project and its expenditures of the requested \$267,184 in UUFB funds, and has also submitted an Appendix G Navajo Nation Grant Application. **EXHIBIT E**.
 - J. On behalf of ARQ, the Navajo Nation Division of Natural Resources Resources Enforcement Department has submitted Navajo Nation Budget Forms for ARQ's funding request. **EXHIBIT F**.
- K. ARQ has submitted support letters for its "Blitz 2022" project, from its proposed partners the
 Navajo Nation Animal Control Program and Altered Tails Barnhart Clinic in Phoenix,
 Arizona. **EXHIBIT G**.
- L. ARQ's funding request has been reviewed through the Navajo Nation's Section 164 Review, and the Office of Management and Budget, the Office of the Controller, and the Department of Justice have indicated that the funding request is "sufficient." **EXHIBIT H**.
- M. The Controller has provided a memorandum regarding this funding request, in compliance with 12 N.N.C. §820(F) and §820(L). **EXHIBIT I**. The Controller has indicated that the proposed expenditures by ARQ are *nonrecurring* expenses; therefore, a waiver of 12 N.N.C. §820(E), §820(F), §820(J), or §820(L) is not necessary.
 - N. The Office of Management and Budget has provided a memorandum regarding this funding

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O. The Navajo Nation Council has determined that approving the requested UUFB funds for ARQ's "Blitz 2022" project is an urgent and critical priority for the Navajo Nation, because the project will directly address the serious problem of animal overpopulation on the Navajo Nation and will be a major step towards preventing further injuries and deaths from roaming dog attacks.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL OF \$267,184 FROM THE UUFB FOR ANIMAL REZ-Q'S PROPOSED PROJECT TITLED: "NAVAJO NATION SPAY, NEUTER, VACCINATION BLITZ 2022"

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves \$267,184 out of the UUFB for Animal Rez-Q, Inc. to implement and conduct its proposed "Navajo Nation Spay, Neuter, Vaccination Blitz 2022" project across the Navajo Nation, in accordance with the attached EXHIBITS D, E, and F.
- B. The \$267,184 in UUFB funds shall be from those revenues that exceed the 10% minimum balance of the UUFB which must be maintained according to 12 N.N.C. §820(J).
- C. The \$267,184 in UUFB funds shall not lapse at the end of Fiscal Year 2022, as would otherwise occur pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §820(N).
- D. Within five business days after the effective date of this Act, the Controller shall transfer the approved \$267,184 in funds to the Division of Natural Resources Resources Enforcement Department. The Resources Enforcement Department shall then promptly begin providing the approved funds to ARQ in accordance with the terms and conditions of an appropriate grant agreement, memorandum of agreement, or other legal document establishing a project schedule, a payment or drawdown plan, a fund management plan, or other relevant procedures, as approved by the Controller and executed by the Director of the Resources Enforcement Department and ARQ.
- E. The \$267,184 in UUFB funds shall be used by ARQ strictly for its "Navajo Nation Spay, Neuter, Vaccination Blitz 2022" project, as described in the attached EXHIBITS D, E, and F.
- F. As a condition of receiving the \$267,184 in UUFB funds, upon request ARQ shall allow the Navajo Nation full access to its financial records related to the approved UUFB funds, for the purpose of the Navajo Nation's review and audit of ARQ's expenditures of the funds.

G. By October 31, 2022, ARQ shall submit a written report, and a verbal report if so requested by the Committee Chairperson, explaining the status of its "Blitz 2022" project and its use of the UUFB funds approved herein, which report shall be presented to the Resources and Development Committee, the Budget and Finance Committee, and the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. SECTION FOUR. EFFECTIVE DATE This Act shall become effective pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §221(B) and 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(17). SECTION FIVE. SAVING CLAUSE If any portion of this Act is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a District Court of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the remainder of this Act shall be the law of the Navajo Nation.
