PURPOSE: The purpose of this legislation is to request the State of Arizona to utilize state revenue sources, and federal revenue sources to prioritize the study, design and construction of the Querino Bridge in Northeastern Arizona, Apache County, near Interstate 40 and Houck community. The Querino Bridge is important to the Houck community and the surrounding communities. The Apache County Supervisor District Two requested federal assistance to U.S. Senator Kyrsten Sinema for federal funds to refurbish or replace the Querino Bridge.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

20	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY						
21	A. The Resources and Development Committee is established as a standing committee of						
22	the Navajo Nation Council with oversight of land, environmental protection and cultural						
23	resources and authority to review and recommend resolutions to the Naabik'íyáti						
24	Committee and Navajo Nation Council to accomplish or impact the Resources and						
25	Development Committee purpose. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 500 (C), and 501 (B)(4)(a).						
26	B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is established as a standing committee of the Navajo						
27	Nation Council with authority to review and continually monitor the programs and						
28	activities of federal and state departments and to assist development of such programs						
29	designed to serve the Navajo People and the Navajo Nation through intergovernmental						
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relationships between the Navajo Nation and such departments. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 700 (A), 701 (A)(7).

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SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Querino Canyon Bridge is picturesquely situated over a rugged and beautiful canyon just outside Houck, Arizona. Designed by the Arizona Highway Department; the bridge is a representative example of early highway truss design: 77 feet long, 20 feet wide, and comprised of a concrete-decked steel trestle with three Pratt deck trusses supported by steel piers. Concrete abutments support the bridge from below and steel lattice guardrails typical of the period line the roadway. The State built the bridge in 1929 as part of a grand rehabilitation and relocation of Route 66 across northern Arizona. The project included several bridges, drainage construction, and at least 25 miles of roadway. The largest of these multiple efforts, the bridge over Querino Canyon formed an integral link on one of America's primary arteries. This section of the highway became a county road during the 1960s after construction of Interstate 40. The Querino Canyon Bridge remains intact, carrying local traffic on Navajo Nation land. It was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1988. The Querino Canyon Bridge crosses Querino Canyon 3.8 miles southwest of Houck, AZ as part of Old Highway 66; (see https://www.nps.gov/places/querino-canyon-bridge.htm); and
- B. The Querino Canyon Bridge is used by the Navajo people, Arizona residents, tourists, Houck Chapter residents, nearby Navajo chapter residents, and nearby communities.
- C. The State of Arizona utilizes the following funding sources for road studies, and to maintain and construct roads throughout the State:
 - Annual State Operating and Capital budgets to fund programs, services, and infrastructure - such as education, public health and safety, roads and bridges; and
 - 2. State Transportation Funds composed of revenue from excise tax, gasoline and use-fuel taxes, motor-carrier taxes, vehicle-license taxes, motor vehicle registration fees, and other miscellaneous fees; and
 - 3. State bonds issued to cover large infrastructure projects; and

- 4. Federal highway funds for the construction of Arizona highways, roads and streets; and
- D. The State of Arizona received federal funds, which include the following Acts:
 - The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, Pub. L. No. 116-136, 134 Stat. 281 (2020), which, at Title V, §5001, entitled "Coronavirus Relief Fund," and
 - 2. The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub L. No. 117-2 also called the COVID-19 Stimulus Package or American Rescue Plan, (March 11, 2021), and
 - 3. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Pub. L. No. 117-58, 135 Stat. 429 (2021), also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Framework (BIF) or Bipartisan Infrastructure Deal (November 15, 2021); and
- E. Roads throughout the Navajo Nation is a very important infrastructure for the safety of all residents within and near to the Navajo Nation, tourists traveling throughout the Navajo Nation, commercial vehicles traveling within and throughout the Navajo Nation, all businesses (retail, commercial and industrial) and their development throughout the Navajo Nation, Navajo, communities, Navajo chapters, and the Navajo people who utilize the roads for life necessities (food, medicine, wood for home heating, water hauling, health and elderly care, education, etc.). The Navajo Nation is 27,000 square miles and roads are an important infrastructure for the Navajo Nation and the Navajo people; and
- F. On May 20, 2022, Honorable Delegate Raymond Smith, Jr., Honorable Delegate Kee Allen Begay, Jr., and Apache County Supervisor Dist. 2 Alton Joe Shepherd, testified at Arizona's State Transportation Public Hearing and Board Meeting, which was held in person or via telephonic or Webex, and requested funds to replace the Querino Bridge, (See:https://aztransportation-board-agenda-220715.pdf); and
- G. By a letter dated May 19, 2022, Apache County Supervisor Dist. 2 Alton Joe Shepherd requested federal assistance to U.S. Senator Kyrsten Sinema for federal funds to refurbish or replace the Querino Bridge, the letter is attached hereto as **Exhibit A**; and

H. It is in the best interest of the Houck Chapter, Tse Si Ani (Lupton) Chapter, Nahata Dziil, Fort Defiance Agency, surrounding Navajo chapters and communities, the Navajo Nation, and the Navajo people that the Navajo Nation requests the State of Arizona to utilize state revenue sources, and federal revenue sources to prioritize the study, design and construction of the Querino Bridge in northeastern Arizona, Apache County, near Interstate 40 and the Houck Community.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL

The Navajo Nation hereby requests the State of Arizona to utilize state revenue sources, and federal revenue sources to prioritize the study, design and construction of the Querino Bridge in northeastern Arizona, Apache County, near Interstate 40 and the Houck Community.

Dear Honorable Senator Sinema,

Ya'ateeh. I am writing to request assistance to seek federal funding to refurbish or replace the Querino Bridge, Structural Number 08071 as listed in the national bridge inventory. The bridge is located in northeastern Arizona, Apache County near Interstate 40 & Houck community. The bridge is part of County Road 7250 and is a segment of the old Route 66. The bridge was built in the 1930's and spans 270' over the Querino Canyon. ADOT performs bi-annual inspections with the last inspection being in July of 2020, the last inspection yielded a sufficiently rating of 19.30 and a Bridge Condition rating of poor. See attachment of report. The bridge is listed with the National Historic Preservation.

The community of Houck is very concerned about the safety of the bridge as each time the I-40 has a backup or an accident occur, the freeway traffic finds its way across the Querino bridge. The semi-truck traffic weighing 26-40 tons exceeds the recommended bridge capacity. Although the bridge is signed with a 3 ton weight limit, intended for passenger cars. Diverted freeway traffic inevitably finds its way across the bridge. The potential for a serious collapse is great and the mental and emotional stress posed from the community members is great, your intervention on this issue is urgently needed.

Apache County District 2 is committed to working together with the Navajo Nation Government, Houck Chapter Government in find a solution to this challenge. We are asking your help in passing legislation to provide federal funding for the preservation of this historic bridge. COUNTY NEAR INTERSTATE 40 AND HOUCK COMMUNITY

I have prepared the above-referenced proposed resolution and associated legislative summary sheet pursuant to your request for legislative drafting. Nevertheless, "the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council shall introduce [the proposed resolution] into the legislative process by assigning it to the respective oversight committee(s) of the Navajo Nation Council having authority over the matters for proper consideration." 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(5).
